The Indigenous Peoples Rights International (IPRI) and Articulação dos Povos Indígenas do Brasil (APIB) invite you to the side-event "Silencing Indigenous Peoples: Launch of 2020 Report on Criminalization and Harassment of Indigenous Leaders in Brazil."

IPRI and APIB developed this report to document the growing criminalization and harassment faced by Brazil's Indigenous Peoples. It focuses on the cases of eleven Indigenous Peoples communities in various regions. The report dissects the practices against indigenous leaders and elaborates on good practices and recommendations for individual and collective protection.
